So Good evening, everyone, and welcome to IMC. And I think last week we didn't we do break up into discussion groups. Well, I thought of doing that again. It's kind of unusual to do it, but but I think it's important. And it's a topic that's been on my mind today. And this is a topic which is, should be very important to all of you who come to someplace like this. And it's a topic that maybe I shouldn't sit up here and expound on the and that is what does it take to be a good student so we have a distinction in our tradition. In Buddhism in general, there's a distinction between teachers and their students, teachers and students, teachers and practitioners. And sometimes that distinction is very strong, tremendous hierarchy difference between the teacher, the guru, and student. And sometimes it's not much difference is made, and so almost like, you know, they're kind of not much of a hierarchy at all. And our tradition, that Theravada tradition, especially when it comes to the west here, we tend more towards the end of the spectrum where we're more were called good spiritual friends. That's the kind of teachers we are so that more kind of in the you know, less hierarchy kind of role. And, and so we're not supposed to sit high up on pedestals whenever and I really didn't want Sit up on this platform. And I used to sit on the foot used to sit, they used to sit in the floor. And I thought that was the right place to be. And some of you, maybe some of you are here now, today, many years ago, because you were there probably, is insisted that I had to get up so people can see me. And so I knew so what we ended up with this platform, against my, against, against my wit whatever wisdom I have, because because this point that we're kind of more or less hierarchy and in our tradition, but still that distinction exists. And, and sometimes the teacher is a student, sometimes the student is the teacher. It's a fluid role. It goes back and forth in various ways. And, but one thing we all share myself included is that at times, we're all Students in this tradition, we study we learn from other teachers or learn from the Buddha we learn from texts. And if a teacher like myself just sits up here and expounds for 45 minutes or for three hours, however long there's a kind of passivity on the part of the recipient. And maybe some of you are very actively engaged in material, but still it's kind of being being given to you. And I think it's really important to engage as a student as a practitioner and not to be a passive recipients with incense be the producer of the teachings in yourself, it has to be that way to really come come alive for you. And so very interesting topic, I think are the qualities of being a good student. And, and one of the reasons I like this topic is it one of the qualities of a good student is taking responsibility for what happened Not just again, not just leaving it in the hands of the teacher, your teacher is the one who's supposed to somehow zap you. And I'll just sit here long enough and eventually I get that zap or whatever. And the responsibility that is the teacher responsibility lies with a student. And one of the very, very interesting ways of looking at this is the assumption is same with people who come to Buddhism, like you're here for whatever reason you're here. You're here to practice. And or perhaps learn about a practice, learn about teaching in a practice that leads to some kind of personal transformation that's very meaningful and significant. And if that's the agenda, then as you hear teachings, on one hand, you could

receive those teachings or hear those teachings through the filter have what you like and don't like, through your preferences, what sound seems like you know, the good or not good or something like that what's true or false or something that's 111 to kind of whole approach. Another approach is to remember that you're here to practice, you're here to understand and be changed. You're here not just to understand something abstract, you're here to understand what's helpful for you and your life. So you take what's being taught, and you transform it, or you apply it or you interpret it or you work it to see how is it this is useful for me. So what that means is that a, you know, a teacher could say something really outrageous, or a teacher could say something really stupid. Or even a teacher consistently, That's, you know, I know some some level seems like a wrong thing to say. And you could be upset or see that, you know, that's terrible. How could the person do that? Or Do back and forth and say, Well, this That can't be true. And I have the truth. Let me tell you, that's certainly valid. I mean, it's okay to do that. But I don't know if it helps you much to do that. Another approach is to turn it around and say, well, that's kind of an odd thing for the person to say, or mostly I disagree with that. But let me study this, what the person said, and how, how or when, and what context might this be useful for me? In what way could this be useful? And, and so that question, how in what way, can I make this useful? In saying how can I make this useful, doesn't mean that you agree with a teacher, it means you are taking and appropriating a sensor or, or finding how to you make this into make you make yourself a better person through these teachings. So what that means, of course, is I don't have to take much responsibility. I mean, and And you know, I say what I say and do the best I can. And the responsibility maybe mostly lies with you. What would you do with it? So that was a long winded introduction to this topic, what are the qualities of a good student? All of you have been students some point in your life, but especially in terms of spiritual discipline, Buddhist practice. What does it take to be a good student? And that shouldn't that be an interesting topic for you? If you're not interested in that topic at all, then no Well, it's okay. But if you're not at all interest in this topic, then maybe I'm better things to do than be here tonight. You guys game for this. Not game

That's more of what I had in mind rather than this no student of algebra or something is a student of spirit a spiritual practice. And so what I had in mind was to do this in two steps. And the first step was for you guys to form little groups of three people. And then discuss it among yourselves for a while. And then and then I saw I'll ring a bell, and then I'll offer you a little different angle on a topic, and then you discuss it some more, maybe stay in the same group, and maybe I'll I'll see how it what it feels like maybe change the configuration a little bit. And then once we once you've had that discussion, I'd like us to come back into, you know, like we are here, and then see if we could come up with a list of good qualities of the students, what it takes to be a good student. And what might be very interesting to see here the range of different things that people have come up with, they might be quite a range of different people have different different perspectives on this topic. So now if this is something you if you came here to because whatever reason, you have a very good reason something important happened in your life, and you came here this was supposed to be a refuge shouldn't be guiet, did not interact with people he came to meditate. If that's the case, it's okay not to participate. I mean, you can go home if you'd like. But you could also stay and just be quiet. Keep meditating and be guiet or go sit in the outer Hall which may be guieter, and then be part of the rest of it and we kind of report back and Don't feel obligated to, to participate if it just doesn't feel right for you. Okay, so groups of three and then once you have a little discussion and then a few minutes, I'll ring a bell and we'll change it

okay so So, there is a kind of a Buddhist cultural understanding that one way to be a good student is to listen to the bell.

so we're what I'd like to do you do now is to take take your group that you're in and join another group. And why don't you do that in silence, do it quietly and so then after you've joined a group that just then I will give you the topic that that's slightly changes this little bit

So the first topic was, what are the qualities of good, good student? What does it take to be a good student? And this this one's first it could could have kind of some of the same answers, but it's a little different angle on it. That's maybe a little unusual think this way. But the question is, what are the responsibilities of a student? What are the responsibilities that come with being a student? So see what you do with that. Thank you for participating in that.

And until you do that you're kind of looking up the bottom of the boat and saying how the boat floats, but I'm just looking at the bottom, I think you kind of need to get in the boat and see if you can make it go, probably probably you can the first time you try. Probably it won't be that satisfying, but it will. It'll, I think until you're ready to, to at least take on your imagination, the role of the teacher, which is like what the Buddha did eventually, then you don't, you're not really a serious student. You have to be willing to take that risk in order to become a complete student. So we talked about other things, but that was that was the thing that meant that that occurred to me the most strongly.
