It's been developed or changing because of that simple practice. And I was reminded of this this morning when I read an article in The New York Times where they talked about that simple practice focusing on the breath when you notice when you're when your mind wanders off, noticing that and coming back. And they had a whole list of this was in the context articles in the context of how they're apparently finding that the trend to use medication to treat variety of forms of attention deficit disorders, and doesn't have a very good track record of being successful. They seem to be successful sometimes for the first year and then the success of these medications tends to wane. And they were comparing it to rates of success here in the United States with rates of success, treating, I guess, attention deficit disorder in Finland. We're in Finland, apparently they don't use medication as much in America and they have just equal rate of success. So I think maybe the medication is overrated. And they said, what they said what's needed is to have a, what's helpful for people is to develop the capacity for them delayed gratification, impulse control, self monitoring, and they listed other other kind of psychological qualities that need to be developed and strengthened. And those tend to help with attention deficit disorder, and they help also with a particular non disorder with that they didn't say it exactly this way, but a particular kind of thing that's similar to attention deficit disorder, but it's completely normal and developmentally found in teenagers, and that they don't have the full development and so they have that some of those easily distracted and then also as people get Older after the age of 60, or 70. Apparently, people's part of the symptoms of mental symptoms getting old is is being easily distractible. So they tend to have attention deficit disorder because he being so easily distracted. So in all these things, it's helpful to develop delayed gratification, impulse control, and self monitoring. And there's some other things I remember the list. And the practice of being on your breath, noticing when your wonder and coming back does all those things. It cultivates late gratification, I'm not going to think about that impulse control, I'm not going to go there, I'm going to come back to one thing, and it's self monitoring, you're knowing what's going on, you're tracking yourself and, and all that. So, and I'm sure there's a long list of other things that benefits that come from simply noticing your wandering off and coming back. So it's a very simple practice and turns out it's a very specific indicated practice, and very helpful and very meaningful. So don't underestimate how useful it is to notice you're distracted and coming back. So this morning, I recommend you do that. Whether you're doing walking meditation or breath meditation, choose something very simple to be the kind of the place where you stabilize or focus your attention. Not necessarily so you successful to stay there and concentrate on there. But so you have that reference point to notice when you get distracted, and see how quickly you can notice it. And the quicker you notice it, the greater you're developing self monitoring, and the guicker you come back, the later you're practicing delayed gratification, impulse control, self mastery, right or different things. That simple thing. And then on top of that, from Buddhist point of view, we add some one other thing to it. That's very helpful. And that is It's really good if you enjoy it so hope you enjoy this morning.
